Travel Tips for Summer: Making the Journey Safer!

With the summer upon us, many of us will be traveling. In order to make the trip more pleasant and safe, we need to ask for accommodations for our hearing loss. (both for ourselves and those who follow us). Below are some tips to make the journey easier. And of course, plan ahead when you can!

By Car

- Use a Pocket Talker so you can hear other people over the road noise.
- Newer hearing aids are Bluetooth capable and have a separate microphone that links directly to a hearing aid. Check to see if this is available for yours.
- Stop every couple of hours to get out and rest listening to the road noise can be very tiring.
- Keep a hearing loss identification card handy in case you are stopped by the police. Failure to obey them can have tragic consequences, and they will not know you have a hearing loss unless you tell them! (See page 61 of the green manual Facing the Challenge of Hearing Loss to make your own.)
- Always pack extra batteries, especially when traveling out of the country. Keep them with you! The constant sound of road noise (plane noise and crowds) will wear out your batteries more quickly so be sure you have enough.


On the Plane

- When making reservations, let them know that you have a hearing loss. They should not seat you in an emergency aisle. You may not be able to follow verbal instructions in an emergency - putting you and the rest of the passengers at risk.
- When you get to the airport, let them know at

- the check-in desk. There is help available!
- Let the **Security / TSA people** know you have a hearing loss - you do NOT want them to detain you or pull a gun on you if you fail to respond to their directions. Remember, they do not know you and they have to be careful.
- Wear a badge indicating you have a hearing loss. (See page 3 for more information)
- In the boarding area again- let the attendants know about your hearing loss and tell them you will not be able to hear any announcements made over the speakers. They will inform you personally of changes and often they will let you board early.
- When boarding the plane, let them know and show your badge. They can provide you with information that you cannot hear over the speaker system, from drinks available to landing delays. You can also share this information with your fellow passengers who cannot hear over the sound of the plane and they will be grateful.

At the Hotel

- Let them know you have a hearing loss and that when you take your hearing aids out,
 - you will NOT hear any loud noises like knocking on the door or the FIREALARM!
- Ask for an assistive listening system. Every hotel is required to have at least one kit, according to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). This law is for us too.*
- The kit should have at a minimum an alarm clock with a bed shaker, a way to amplify the phone, a door knocker with a flashing light, a fire alarm with a flashing strobe light.

Continued from page 1 • On the TV, make sure that the captioning is set to be turned on. (It is a "menu function" on all TVs over 13" made after 1993.) Also make sure that the TV will not default to "no captioning" when the set is turned off. This can happen when the set is programmed with a "Master Remote" that is different from the room remote.

- By asking for the kit, you will be helping others who will stay
 at that hotel in the future. The hotels have to buy this equipment. If no one asks for it they think it was a waste of money
 and unneeded. Please help change this attitude and keep us
 all safe! The more people that ask for and use these things
 the more the hotel staff feel like they are helping us (and
 they are!) and that the expense is justified. (It is!)
- Too often, when we have requested an assistive listening kit we have been told that this is the first time anyone has ever asked for it. We want that to change, please do your part!

5 – <u>"Face Me" Badge</u>: There are 8 badges on each sheet. Using regular paper, it is easier to print the pages separately (not double-sided). Cut out along outside edges. <u>They are designed to fit in a vertical badge holder</u> (<u>insert size 2.5 x 3.5</u>) <u>available at office supply stores.</u> A different style can be used on each side of the badge. They can be fastened to you with an I.D. strap clip or a large safety pin. These are very helpful when traveling.
